The topic leader has main responsibility for preparing the topic. However, we would **encourage the topic leader and supporter to chat a few days beforehand**; great ideas result and the session usually flows so much better.

Golden (Unstructured) Time is the topic during children's holidays and busy times; when we expect very few and possibly even no children attending. At these times we will only provide one DBS checked adult and parents will be expected to stay with their children. Golden time is a time when there is a chance for the children to spend time in more unstructured or self chosen activities. We encourage games, craft, painting or if the leader wishes to run a topic of their own we are grateful. We have games, toys, art materials and books available for the children, parents and leader to make use of. The children may also bring games, books, sewing or other activities they might like to share or lead but it would be helpful if their parent could let the leader know if they plan to bring something the evening before.

Muted Sunday Morning Meetings

During October we tried an experiment of holding muted meetings on Sunday mornings. The feedback we have had from this tells us that there are still people who prefer at least some microphones being left unmuted. So, going forward, Elders suggest that individuals make their own decisions about whether to mute their microphones or not. This will hopefully provide a good balance. The only proviso is that if there is a problem with noise - technical or otherwise - affecting the meeting then the host of the meeting will mute the individual in question if necessary.

Quaker insights in the context of ecological crisis: New Creation: The Peaceable Kingdom, 9th December, 10:30 - 11:30 Final session

Friends, we are called into wholeness and into community, women and men alike, sharing the responsibilities God has given us, and assuming the leadership we are called to. We begin where we are, in our homes and meetings or churches, our work and communities, celebrating the realisation of the New Creation. (QF&P 23.40)

The vision of the peaceable kingdom has always inspired Friends. Bit by bit, this kingdom can become a reality on earth as we die to the domination that darkness and evil has over us. When the seeds of greed, hatred, cruelty, violence and destruction are rooted out of the human heart, the institutions and ideologies that sustain this darkness and evil begin to lose their power, and the wholeness, well-being and justice of Gospel Order⁽²⁾ can take their place. We are not in control of this process, but we can play our part. Like physical exercise, we have to start somewhere and build up our stamina. Right relationship and Gospel Order are not static concepts. Instead, they represent dynamic, on-going processes.

Ecological Reflection

The vision of the peaceable kingdom is an ecological vision. Shalom or Gospel Order represents a state of harmony based on complex interdependence and right relationship. If all things are interconnected, then all actions based on compassion, healing and justice, however small, will have a positive impact. In the peaceable kingdom we take our place within this web of life; not above it, or in control of it, but as an essential part of it.

Are you able to keep the vision of the peaceable kingdom in mind, even though it seems so different from the way the world currently functions? Can you <u>discern</u> the seeds of the kingdom in your day-to-day life and interactions?
